THE FILM

Healing a Soldier's Heart is an intimate, transformative documentary that follows four Vietnam War veterans, all suffering from severe PTSD, as they return to Vietnam to confront their past actions and to seek forgiveness for their actions from their former enemies. Each of our four protagonists carry within the invisible wounds of war—nightmares, guilt, addiction, and a sense of spiritual disconnection or "soul loss"—hallmarks of moral injury and PTSD. Under the care of Dr. Edward Tick, a trailblazing psychotherapist who has devoted his life to healing veterans, the men embark on a sacred pilgrimage to the sites where they fought, killed, and lost some of their dearest friends.

Tick appears throughout the film as a poetic beacon of compassion and empathy. His immersive, cross-cultural approach fuses psychotherapy, ritual, and face-to-face meetings with former Vietnamese soldiers, allowing the American vets to listen, express heartfelt apologies, engage in Buddhist prayer, and offer gifts and other acts of restitution. Tick reminds us: "*The same suffering goes on consciously or unconsciously. But we have to make the suffering conscious in order to achieve healing.*"

Finally, viewers witness something quite rare in both cinema and mental health: men once on the brink of suicide rediscovering meaning, peace, and a new sense of well-being and spiritual wholeness. Their profound shift from broken warriors to spiritually reawakened human beings offers insights and approaches for millions of other PTSD-suffering veterans from the Vietnam war, as well as the more recent wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

WHY THIS FILM NOW?

In 2014, the VA announced that 22 veterans were killing themselves each day. Today, a decade later, 17 US veterans are still taking their own lives every day. The PTSD problem has not gone away. For many veterans of wars in Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan, the psychological wounds of war remain unhealed, their suffering buried beneath decades of silence, stigma, or neglect. *Healing a Soldier's Heart* is an apolitical call to compassion, a tribute to those who continue to carry the trauma of war within them, and a blueprint for recovery.

Now, on the 50th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War, a onehour version of the award-winning *Healing a Soldier's Heart* will premiere on PBS stations. American Public Television (APT) will distribute the film for viewing to coincide with Veterans Day, November 11, 2025.



A CRITICAL TIME

The 50-year anniversary of the end of the Vietnam war means that for many Vietnam veterans, now in the final chapters of their lives, the urgency to honor their suffering—and learn from stories of reconciliation and transformation—has never been greater.

This film shows that it is possible to close open wounds with compassion, cross-cultural connection, and spiritual courage.

The national broadcast of *Healing a Soldier's Heart*, highlighting stories of the pain and the potential for real healing, underscores our collective support for the wellbeing of our veterans. We honor the deep sacrifices they have made for our country.

KEY THEMES & IMPACT

- Moral Injury and PTSD The film exposes the psychological harm when combat violates a soldier's personal moral code, leaving a moral trauma that continues long after physical wounds heal.
- Cross-Cultural Reconciliation and Restitution Asking for forgiveness from the Vietnamese people—including former adversaries—and atoning by "giving something back" plays a critical role in the veterans' healing.
- Spiritual Recovery Through this sacred pilgrimage, integrating Buddhist rituals and prayer, the film powerfully illustrates the vital role of faith and spirituality in addressing trauma.
- The Family Impact The film highlights the role of spouses and families in the recovery process.
- Historical & Contemporary Value As PTSD affects new generations of vets from more recent wars, the film will serve as a timely resource, demonstrating immersive, in-country healing methods that go beyond medication or talk therapy, and are being applied to other current conflicts.





A National Emmy, Peabody and duPont-Columbia Award-winning director, Olsson's work has received recognition and awards at major film festivals such as Sundance, Tribeca, IDFA, Mill Valley, Tel Aviv, Tehran, Dubai, Sarajevo, WOMEX, and many national and international festivals. 




Edward Tick, PhD is a nonfiction writer, poet, transformational healer, holistic psychotherapist, educator, and international journey guide. For over forty years, he has worked to heal the invisible wounds of war and violent trauma. Author of ten books, Dr. Tick is internationally recognized for pioneering spiritual, holistic, and community-based approaches to treating PTSD and moral injury, particularly among veterans and survivors of severe violence.

Dr. Tick's influential books—including the award-winning *War and the Soul* introduced the ancient concept of soul wounding and its relevance to modern trauma recovery. He has led trainings, retreats, and workshops worldwide and collaborated extensively with the Department of Defense and Veterans Administration, where his work is widely implemented. For a decade, he served as the U.S. military's subject matter expert on PTSD and Moral Injury.


